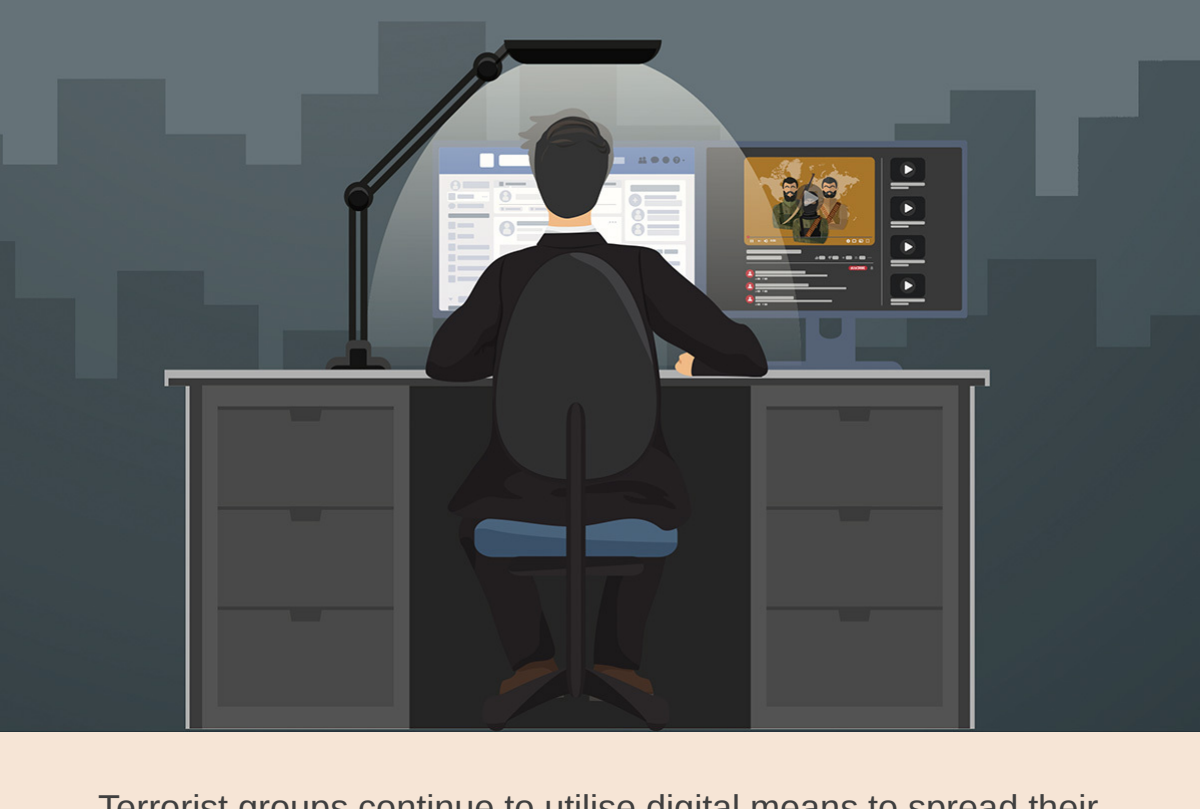

In recent times, terrorist groups have utilised new methods to spread their agenda and influence individuals, and we must remain vigilant. Read on to find out more on how you can help to prevent radicalisation in the workplace and keep businesses safe.

RECOGNISE SIGNS OF ONLINE RADICALISATION



Terrorist groups continue to utilise digital means to spread their agenda. If you spot a colleague who visits websites that promote extremist content, shares radical views or advocates for violence on social media, do alert your supervisor.

KNOW THE SIGNS OF RADICALISATION



As reps, it is important for you to identify the tell-tale signs of individuals who have been radicalised. These include sharing their extremist views with you and other colleagues, making remarks that promote ill-will or hatred towards people of other races or religions, and expressing support for terrorist groups as well as the use of violence.

IDENTIFY AND STOP POTENTIAL ACTS OF TERRORISM



Lookout for signs that someone is about to commit or contribute to acts of extremism. These individuals may have:

- Previously expressed intent to participate in acts of violence overseas or in Singapore,
- Asked you and other colleagues to participate in such acts,
- Persuaded you to provide support through remitting money, providing services, supplies, or any material to a terrorist organisation to facilitate or carry out any terrorist act.

You may also utilise **TOPSIS** to better identify potential threats before it happens and promote greater workplace vigilance against terrorism and crime.

Staying vigilant against radicalisation is crucial in keeping Singapore and our economy safe. As the time between radicalisation and commission of violence can be very short, early reporting allows the authorities to investigate and intervene quickly to stem the radicalisation, before the individual harms or kills someone.
